Talavera Gathering - Remembering the Past and Looking to the Future

The Royal Anglian Regiment gathered in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre Northampton on a sunny afternoon on Saturday 29 July as part of its Talavera Day celebrations. An annual remembrance service was held, the congregation also witnessed the re-dedication of two memorial windows to our local predecessor, the Northamptonshire Regiment.

The windows, which commemorate service in India and the First Boer War in the late nineteenth century, have been restored by the Saint Sepulchre's Restoration Trust after a considerable fund-raising effort, with I20 year-old stonework and lead replaced and the glass thoroughly cleaned.

The service was attended by the Lord-Lieutenant of Northamptonshire, Mr James Saunders Watson and his wife Lizzie, the Lord-Lieutenant of Rutland Dr Sarah Furness, the County Colonel of the Royal Anglian Regiment Colonel Robert Blomfield, Chairman of West Northamptonshire Council John Shephard, Chair of North Northamptonshire Council Barbara Jenney, Vice-Chair of Rutland County Council Samantha Harvey, Sir Michael Ellis MP for Northampton North, the Mayor of Northampton Stephen Hibbert and Mayoress Liz Cox, Councillor Paul Ainsley, Armed Forces Champion of Oakham Town Council, Trustees of the Restoration Trust, veterans of the Regimental Association and standards of the Royal British Legion from both counties.



Also in attendance were Brigadier Richard Lyne, Deputy Colonel of the Royal Anglian Regiment, and officers and soldiers of the 2nd Battalion from Kendrew Barracks Cottesmore led by their Commanding

Officer, Lieutenant Colonel Ben Hawes. Also, Cadets from A Company, Leicestershire, Northamptonshire & Rutland Army Cadet Force led by their Officer Commanding, Major Jordan Peplow. Brooke Weston Academy CCF was also represented, and Major Andrew Huxter, Contingent Commander Uppingham School CCF, read a lesson.

The re-dedication was made by Bishop Andrew Proud Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Peterborough, and the service led by The Reverend Tom Wilde, Chaplain to 2 Royal Anglian. The Band of The Royal Anglian Regiment played throughout, and there was tea & cake for all afterwards.

The link with Rutland is the 58th Foot, the old Rutlandshire Regiment, which amalgamated with the 48th or Northamptonshires to form the 2nd Battalion of the new Northamptonshire Regiment in 1881. In 1964 the Northamptons joined with the Royal Lincolnshire Regiment to become the 2nd Battalion, The Royal Anglian Regiment.

The presence of so many young Cadets added to the poignancy of the occasion. CCF and ACF Cadets provided the Guard of Honour and laid two wreaths during the service. Afterward, they were all addressed by Brigadier Lyne in his role as Colonel Cadets for the Royal Anglian Regiment. He said "It was brilliant to see so many Cadets on parade and taking such an important part in today's events. There is no doubt there is great mutual benefit in the different generations of the Army family coming together, and our Regimental family is rightly proud of the Cadets who wear our cap badge. An event like this represents a fusion of past, present and future. It is inspirational to see young people so enthusiastic about participating with the modern Army and contributing to its future while still engaging with the history of their forebears."

1st Battalion (The Vikings)

The Sunsets on a Successful Cyprus Deployment for the Vikings

In July, the Battalion's main effort has been the arms plot move from Alexander Barracks in Dhekelia to Kendrew Barracks in Cottesmore, after our two year tour. The Battalion has had seventeen previous semi-permanent residential bases, four of them were operational tours: one in Aden and three in Northern Ireland. From the thirteen that were not operational tours, the Battalion conducted fifteen operational tours in Northern Ireland, the Balkans, Iraq and Afghanistan. The intention is for Kendrew Barracks to be the new permanent home for the Battalion as a Security Force Assistance Battalion, so this really is a new chapter.



As we reflect on our Cyprus tour, recent activities have included Ops Commitments, in Cyprus and Bahrain, support to our 2nd Battalion and Queen's Dragoon Guards exercises in Oman and Kuwait and most recently Op POLAR BEAR, supporting the evacuation from Sudan. And a Company Group has recently returned from exercises in Belize. The Battalion has been runners-up in the Army Boxing. As well as all the military training and deployments, the Battalion has played a full part in life in Cyprus, and will look back on the tour with happy memories.

Ahead of the Battalion is re-subordination to 11 Brigade, the Security Force Assistance (SFA) Brigade and restructuring to the SFA role for tasks in Europe. Warning Orders have already been received for training Ukrainian Armed Forces and for two overseas tasks. The Battalion is looking forward to all the challenges in the new chapter, and of living and working closely with our 2nd Battalion.

At the end of July, the Battalion is taking four weeks of well-earned leave. And the run in to our Summer leave has been as busy as ever. The major event, of course was the Battalion deployment to Oman from January to April with the last rear party elements returning in June.

Those involved in the Regiments' contribution to the Coronation took the quick change from hot desert training to temperate ceremonial parades in their stride. After leave the Battalion will focus on Ex Spring Storm in the Baltics, Project PARATUS with 300 vehicles at very short notice to move, and Ex Wessex Storm. We are looking forward to welcoming the Ist Battalion to Kendrew Barracks, and to working closely with them.

ADVENTURE TRAINING

Soldiers from across 3 Royal Anglian took part in fore days of Adventure Training in the Peak District. Based at the Leslie Johnson Centre in Warslow. The participants took part in two days of Mountain Biking, a day of Walking, and a day of Rock Climbing.

Mountain Biking was situated, on day one, in the Derwent and Ladybower Reservoirs areas of the Peak District. Both reservoirs are famous for the role they played in practicing Royal Air Force crews for the World War Two Dambuster raids. The Second day of Mountain Biking was centred around Hathersage and the Stanage Edge fells.

Rock climbing took place on The Roaches just North of Leek, Staffordshire. This was the first time our newly qualified Rock-Climbing Supervisor, Lance Corporal Abi Hurrell had supervised a group and it was good to have new, younger, and more enthusiastic member in the Adventure Training Team.

Through The Door With - Exercise Tigers Breach



2 Company were the lead for Ex Tiger's Breach over the weekend of the 14 -16 Jul 23, which was attended by 56 service personnel from across 3 Royal Anglian. The Exercise was conducted at the Urban Training Centre at Merville Barracks, Colchester and practiced the soldiers in urban assault tactics including door drills (fighting from the doorway and clearance of the doorway before gaining entry), and stoppage drills. This final phase included the introduction of Simunition Rounds and bringing a force-on-force element to improve battlefield discipline. The lessens learnt from the force-on-force element was that it brought a level hesitancy with soldiers freezing in doorways or on corners and that soldiers must commit on their violence of actions.

Our Regimental Heritage



The 70th Anniversary of the Korean War - 25 June 1950 - 27 July 1953



Extract from our Regimental History¹ covering the Korean War

In 1951 two of our forebear Regiments, The 1st Battalion The Royal Norfolk Regiment and The 1st Battalion The Royal Leicestershire Regiment went to a war which was unlike any war in history — a war fought for freedom against Communism by a bewildering miscellany of nationalities: Americans, British, Australians, Canadians, Frenchman, Belgians, Turks, Greeks, Filipinos, Thailanders, Puerto Ricans, Ethiopians, New Zealanders, South Africans, Indians.

The Battalions bore little resemblance to the pre-war and wartime model: many officers and senior N.C.Os were no strangers to war, and there was a sprinkling of young regulars who had enlisted since 1945.

But the large majority – something over 60 per cent – were Royal Norfolks and Royal Leicestershires of an entirely new type: they were in the British Army because the Government decreed that they should be; they were old enough to kill or be killed, but too young to vote; before sailing to Korea they had but the haziest idea where the country was or what the war being fought there was about. These were the new controversial military hybrids, the National Servicemen; they went out to Korea as boys, and those that returned came back as men.

For the men of the Battalions there were all the less glamorous chores of modern warfare – endless digging and wiring, for in close proximity to a determined enemy work on defensive positions was never finished. There was the continuous nerve-racking routine of patrols in the 5,000 yards of No Man's Land – fighting patrols, reconnaissance patrols, ambush patrols. And there was always sporadic shelling and mortaring; the World War Two Norfolks and Leicestershires dismissed this contemptuously as being nothing worse than of nuisance value, but the shells took a steady toll of casualties.

When summer came the weather changed from freezing misery to sultry heat and drenching rain – roads became churning nightmares of mud; bunkers and bridges collapsed.

In the summer and autumn of 1952 there were very few major operations at Battalion or even company level. For it had become essentially a subaltern's war – hardly a day or night passed without a platoon clash, an ambush, a brisk fight in No Man's Land.

Casualties were not light. Many members of our forbear Regiments were decorated for their gallantry. Korea 1951-1952 was the last Battle Honour awarded to the Royal Norfolk Regiment and the Royal Leicestershire Regiment, and is carried today on our Regimental Colours. *Footnotes:This article, with minor amendments is from: The Royal Norfolk Regiment by Tom Carew. 21st Century Royal Anglian Soldier Project Arrives at Landguard Fort

Landguard Fort Museum at Felixstowe on the Suffolk coast has become the latest museum to accept a 21st Century Royal Anglian Soldier exhibit. The C21 project aims to link our own regimental history to the historical narrative of our forbear regiments, in this case the Suffolk Regiment and the East Anglian Regiment. Both regiments garrisoned the impressive coastal fort at different times in their history.



The centrepiece of the exhibit is a life-size mannequin, dressed and equipped as a contemporary Royal Anglian Soldier. In addition, there is a pull-up banner which displays a narrative linking the history of the forbear regiments, and linking forward to today's Royal Anglian Regiment, and in this case to B (Suffolk) Company of the Ist Battalion in particular. The narrative and the mannequin are in turn complimented with an audio-visual unit that displays our series of Royal Anglian films.


Deputy Regt Sec, Major Mike Peters On Handing Over the C21 Soldier

A further 2 C21 Soldiers are scheduled for delivery to the Essex Regiment Museum at Chelmsford, and the Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire Regiment Museum at Wardown House in Luton. The two new exhibits will link their historical narratives to C (Essex) Coy, Ist Battalion, and D (Bedfs. Herts) Coy, 2nd Battalion. They will both be in place before the end of August.

Looking ahead to further Regt heritage outreach activity, a survey is currently underway at the Museum of Lincolnshire Life in Lincoln. It is hoped that the timeline of the existing Royal Lincolnshire Regiment gallery can be extended. The addition of a C21 Royal Anglian Soldier exhibition focused on A (Lincolnshire) Company, 2nd Battalion maintaining our strong bonds with our forbear regiment, and the county.

Our Regimental Museum - Future Plans

Our museum's 25 year lease for its gallery in Land Warfare is due to expire in 2025. By happy coincidence, this is when Land Warfare is due to be demolished as part of the masterplan for the exciting redevelopment of IWM Duxford.



Our museum has been offered a new site in the hanger currently known as *Airspace*, which is due to be redeveloped as a new exhibition called *Post WW2 and Cold War Conflict*. For a regiment formed in the 1960s with experience of most of the operations in this period, we think this is a very good fit. One of the reasons our current museum had so many visitors is because it is in Land Warfare, a major attraction, closely connected in every way to the museum of an infantry regiment. We think this will also be true in our proposed new home, *Post WW2 and Cold War Conflict*. Negotiations are at an early stage and we are looking forward to working closely with the IWM to develop a world class regimental museum, closely integrated within the IWMs proposed new *Post WW2 and Cold War Conflict*. We will keep you posted.

Minden Day at the Keep

30 July - Veterans of the Suffolk Regiment and the Royal Anglian Regiment held their annual commemoration of Minden Day on Sunday at The Keep, Gibraltar Barracks, Risbygate, Bury St Edmunds. The annual event was attended by the Mayor, Councillor Diane Hind, and Deputy Mayor, Councillor Donna Higgins.

There was a march past by veterans of both regiments with the regiment's colours and standards of the Suffolk Associations on parade, and the salute was taken by the Mayor and Association President Brigadier (Retired) AJK Calder OBE DL. Suffolk veteran and former war correspondent and independent MP Martin Bell (84) once again marched at the front of the parade.

The Battle of Minden was a major engagement during the Seven Years' War, fought on I August 1759. An Anglo-German army under the overall command of Prussian Field Marshal Ferdinand of Brunswick defeated a French army commanded by Marshal of France, Marquis de Contades. The Suffolk Regiment, then the I2th Regiment of Foot, passed through German gardens on their way to battle and picked roses that were placed in their headdress, a tradition that is still maintained on Minden Day.
